The annual Fifth Form play took to the stage on Monday 21 and Tuesday 22 March. 'East End Tales' is a series of nine stories inspired by photos and news articles from local papers in East London. It was written as part of The Half Moon Theatre's Young People's Scriptworks Project in 2008. The story ideas were initially developed by a group of young people aged 15 and 16 over a number of weeks, through a mixture of workshops, improvisation and written exercises, before being finally shaped and written up in a very definite lyrical style by Fin Kennedy.

The stories range from short contemplations on the nature of living in East London, through to longer tales exploring issues such as domestic violence, the drudgery of low-skilled jobs, petty crime and high density living. An 18-strong ensemble cast produced an exciting and vibrant production that entertained and also provoked controversy and debate.

After our victorious campaign in the Festival Tournament in 2015, the organisers of the Rosslyn Park National Tournament put us into the new 'Cup' section this year. Quantum Society



a psychological adaptation of this 17th Century play, whilst also familiarising themselves with Shakespeare's hometown (both playwrights providing texts for our A Level exam).

With all the comedic scenes cut from the production, we were able to consider the severity of committing to immorality, the power of our conscience and one man's desperation to find fulfilment. The Director, Maria Aberg, certainly gave us an alternative presentation of Marlowe's work, Faustus having child-like qualities and Satan being a dominant, deceptive woman.

We were all particularly moved by a heartwrenching scene where Faustus attempted to dance with and embrace a spirit posed as the fourteen year old Helen of Troy. As he threw her around like a doll in frustration, the audience felt for both Helen of Troy's

story as well as Faustus, his desperation for fulfilment conveyed perfectly by Oliver Ryan. Despite the removal of all comedic scenes, the play had many entertaining elements, such as the promiscuous presentation of the seven deadly sins, in a cabaret style.

The Upper Sixth pupils and teachers came away from the Swan Theatre thrilled by such an inventive, disturbing and intense production of Marlowe's play. It has certainly contributed towards our understanding of the text, which will be put into practice during our exam in June.

Our visit to Stratford upon Avon ended fittingly with a drive past Shakespeare's home - the afternoon being a reminder of two 17th Century literary masterminds.

StoweBots: The VEX Robotics UK National Finals

Both Stowe's robotics teams attended the National VEX Robotics Finals in Birmingham from Friday 18 March. The teams had qualified though regional events during the year. The National Final took place over three days and included 40 of the country's best teams (out of over 200 teams that were involved nationally).


After the first practice day it was clear that both teams were performing well, with the Senior team looking very strong and consistent. During the first day of competition, in the randomly paired qualification matches, both teams performed well with the Seniors finishing the day fourth in the rankings and the Juniors tenth out of 40 teams. On the final day, as the qualification matches continued, both teams continued to win. The Seniors qualified in third place and the Juniors in sixth. These high rankings allowed them to be selected in two strong alliances for the quarter-final matches. Both teams played well and won moving them through to the semi-finals. However, with the way the draw went they ended up facing each other in the semi-final games. The first game went to a 199 point draw, the second and third match went to the Senior team (scores of 222-180 and 228-152) meaning the Senior team progressed to the final match. The Senior teams alliance (with Stanborough and De Montford School) then faced up against one of the countries strongest robotics teams (four time National Champions) and their alliance. Despite strong performances they lost the final one game to two. However, as the winning teams already had places at the World Finals the final place was determined through the regional excellence awards and went to the Senior Stowe team. This means they now have the opportunity to join 200 of the world's strongest VEX robotics teams in Kentucky, USA to compete for the World Champion title.

Along with the core competition the day included a one minute programming skills challenge and a one minute solo driving skills challenge in which the team had to score as many points as possible. The Senior team ranked second in driving skills and fourth in the programming skills. The Junior team finished fourth in the driving skills challenge and second in the programming skills challenge.

These results reflect the time and effort that both teams have put into their robot designs and builds over the year. It takes good design, innovation, engineering skills and good problem solving skills to build a successful robot for these events.

The World Finals take place from 20 to 23 April. The Senior team will be making some improvements to their robot in the hope of a better performance in the World Finals. They will also need to rapidly plan and find funding for the travel to the event. The game remains the same in the World Finals and involves scoring balls in a high or low goal for points. A new game is released after the World Finals and the design process will begin again for the 2016-2017 season.

There was also time to go into the centre of Rome for both food and sight-seeing. A huge thank you is owed to Miss Goodman, whose expertise was essential to the trip and to the Stoics who made it enjoyable and a success.

500 Words Competition

Six years ago, Chris Evans had a dream: to get children excited about reading and writing. 500 Words is now one of the most successful story-writing competitions for children in the world. Nearly half a million pupils have entered the competition. Entrants have to write an original story on any subject or theme in 500 words or less. If they win, their story is read live on the radio by a superstar celebrity. Our very own Biology teacher Kathryn Hinds has been selected to act as a judge for the children aged 10-13 years category. She has been sent a batch of 26 stories to work through and comment on. The top 50 stories will be announced on Monday 9 May.

CSI: Stowe

Yellow and black sticky tape declaring 'Police Crime Scene' isn't what every Third Former expects to see on entering the Science Department - unless it's National Science Week. For the week commencing 14 March, the Science Department staged the alleged murder of Head of Science Mr Tearle, by one of seven suspected teachers and every Third Former became a forensic scientist trying to discover the identity of the murderer.

Allocated to teams of four, under a chosen team leader, every science lesson engaged the Stoics in a series of independent forensic examinations that eventually led to the elimination of six of the seven suspects. Skilfully choreographed by Mr Thompson, the pupils made notes of the crime scene, analysed substances found there; measured blood spatter patterns; chromatographed the poison pen letter; decoded a secret cipher; DNA tested hair; matched fingerprints to the suspects; calculated the pressure of footprints on the floor and examined potential weapon indentations. With no one telling them whether their conclusions were right or wrong and competition between teams, there was pressure to pay attention to detail and work together as a team. At the end of the week, each team leader presented their report, naming the culprit and giving evidence for their choice. The Third Form engaged with the activities with whole-hearted enthusiasm.

Army Section Field Day - A Cadet's Perspective

Stowe's Third Form pupils had the chance on Wednesday 16 March to showcase their talents as architects and designers as part of the Lent Term Challenge: to produce the best designs for a new boys' boarding house facing Chapel Court. The challenge was launched at the start of term with a talk from an architect from Rick Mather Architects (RMA), who set the brief to design a boarding house that would embody the vision of Stowe, sit well within and enhance its setting, have interior spaces that encourage calmness, well-being, intellectual inquiry and also socialising, have eco-friendly credentials and yet not be too ostentatious or out of line with the other boarding houses. The groups had to take charge of their work, think through strategies, conduct research, learn to use design tools and organise their final presentation leading up to the fair in the Marble Saloon and Temple Room, where each group had a stall and had to pitch their design and ideas to a panel of three roving judges.

Many of the designs produced were very impressive. Groups had conducted detailed research on eco-friendly building materials and techniques and had thought about how

these would be applied. Many also used the professional design software tool 'SketchUp' to create 3D drawings of both the exterior look and the interior spaces and some had also found other tools to design floorplans. The project provided important experience and lessons in project planning and collaboration, along with encouraging Stoics to see how the different subjects they study at Stowe work together in real-world situations.

The winning group produced an exciting design which looked a little like the Millennium Falcon from Star Wars, but with classical touches like pillars along the front that meant that it provided an attractive blend of past and present. Details such as interior room designs had been thought through based on the psychology of colours and throughout there was a strong sense of style. Their ideas and others from the pupils will now be passed on to the architects and the winning Stoics will have the opportunity to do work experience with the RMA if they choose. Altogether an exciting term's work!
