Over Half term 15 intrepid Sixth Formers flew to South Africa to participate in the Warriors' programme with pupils from other schools. The activities took us well out of our comfort zones, with the first event being a skydive from 11,000 metres. It was really daunting and some of us felt sick but everyone landed safely. Our next main activity was a 30km hike, during which we had a break and slid down a natural slide made by a steep wet rock face into a pool of water. It was breath-taking!

The biggest challenges included a tandem jump off a cliff with a 68m free fall at 180km/h, abseiling down a 90m waterfall at Lisbon Falls that features in Taylor Swift's Wildest Dream music video, and some of us bravely jumped off a 16m dam into freezing water which we later learned was infested with crocodiles. We also constructed our own bridge jump and had to fall face first off the edge

We had a truly heart-warming experience at an orphanage in Lenyenye. The minute we entered, the children asked to be picked up and hugged. We saw young honey badgers and cheetah in an animal sanctuary and learned about the most poisonous snakes in Africa, held a python and fed a lizard at a reptile sanctuary. We also learned about tribal life in South Africa and watched an exhilarating performance of traditional African dances, hearing about the history and lifestyle of the tribe and then shared a delicious meal with them.

This experience was everything we had hoped for and much more. We would recommend the Warriors' trip to anyone considering it.

'Lysistrata'

Lysistrata is an out and out farcical comedy by Aristophanes. Originally performed in classical Athens in 411 BC, it is a hilarious account of one woman's extraordinary pledge to end the Peloponnesian War. Lysistrata persuades the women of Greece to withhold sexual privileges from their husbands and lovers as a means of forcing the men to negotiate peace - a strategy, however, that simply inflames the battle between the sexes. The Congreve production David Stuttard's version of the play (hovering very neatly between translation and very free adaptation) bounced along very nicely and the three packed houses in the Roxy on November 26/27/28 lapped up the heady mix of overt, exaggerated, cartoon style visuals; verbal ingenuity and relentless double-entendres (some of them added in by NDB) giving the whole production the feel of an upmarket 'Carry On' film.

On 8 December a select group of RN cadets, comprising Lottie Hopkinson (Stanhope, 5ths), Mahlatse Mabitsela (Fourth Form, Queen's), Mint Kanjana (Fifth Form, Queen's), Sandile Tilibe and Oscar Hill (Fourth Form, Temple), and Zizo Chuma (Fourth Form, Lyttelton) visited the RN Firefighting and Damage Control School at HMS Excellent, Portsmouth, accompanied by Lt Cdr Critchley, Lt Eason-Bassett and no less a person than Mrs Donaldson, the School's Health, Safety & Compliance Manager. Here they were given training in preventing and fighting fire, with an ample number of practice extinguishers and impressive fires to be put out. They then transferred to the legendary DRIU, which is an advanced damage simulator. After some brief and focused training, the Stoics found themselves on a ship's mess deck. Several of the bulkheads had been pierced by shot, and seawater was starting to come through the resulting holes and flood the compartment. Could they block the holes and halt the flooding before it rose above head level? Meanwhile

Mrs Donaldson has come back with major additions to the banter with which she punctuates fire awareness lessons, and Stowe staff can expect to hear unaccustomed naval expressions as part of their fire training.

Stowe Team Visits Jhenaidah, Bangladesh

A Stowe CCF team, consisting of Lt Cdr Critchley and Capt Goodall, travelled to Bangladesh to visit Jhenaidah Cadet College as part of the College's programme of developing links with the UK educational world. The Stowe team toured the College, attended an evening presentation by the cadets entitled 'Digital Bangladesh', watched an exhibition basketball match between the Adjutant's Team and the Medical Officer's Team, took the salute at a morning Parade and March Past, and attended dinner with the Adjutant General and British Defence Attaché in Dhaka. A companion visit to Joypurhat Girls' Cadet College unfortunately had to be called off due to fog at the last moment. Consideration is now being given to further joint ventures and exchanges.

The StoweBot teams attended their second Regional competition in the VEX Robotics Competition. Both teams performed well with the Senior team scoring a national high score of 206 during the qualifying rounds with their partner robot from East Barnet School. History Society

The Senior History Society (Pitt the Elder) has had a very busy term, meeting regularly on a Monday afternoon to discuss aspects of history beyond the scope of the normal curriculum. Membership of the Society is optional for A Level historians so it is encouraging to have had around 20 Stoics attending each week. Their commitment and contributions have been impressive.

The culmination of events this term was an online debate on two broad historical questions. The first proposition under scrutiny was "Wars are not won by generals and decision-makers but rather by luck and circumstance", which encouraged a broad analysis of military history. The second concurrent debate took place around the motion "We can be proud of British history. It is mostly a positive story", which brought out both patriotic and more cynical viewpoints. Four teams battled each other on a message board hosted on the School's VLE, fuelled by Coca Cola and doughnuts. This less traditional format was embraced by students, who wrote over 3,000 words through 70 separate posts in around 40 minutes of hotly contested debate. It was excellent to see opinionated and forthright views being developed and challenged in a room of near silent pupils!

In the Lent term, the Society can look forward to the election of a student committee, the award of the McElwee Prizes (which is open to all of the Lower Sixth), the visit of the well known military historian Saul David, a Question Time style debate with two current MPs and a talk by senior diplomats involved in the Oslo Accords. I am sure that Society dinners will also be much anticipated.

Weekly meetings will help members to make the most of these exciting opportunities and continue to stretch them to consider history more broadly than the exam structure allows. With a number of members hoping to study History at either Oxford or Cambridge, these events will also give them plenty to consider in preparation for a challenging application process next autumn. Having joined the School in September, I was unsure what to expect from such a group but I have been consistently impressed by the members and their enthusiasm for the subject. It has been one of many highlights of the History department at Stowe and I look forward to continuing working with this engaging group of historians after Christmas.

Dr Stuart Eves

Leading Space scientist Dr Stuart Eves gave a fascinating talk to Physics students in November. I think the thing that sticks in my mind is how well Stuart knows Buzz Aldrin, and he spoke about Buzz's single minded determination that we should travel to Mars – apparently he always carries with him wherever he goes all the flight information and trajectories!
