

## Poetry by Heart

On Monday 23 April we held the final heats of the Headmaster's Poetry by Heart competition. The awards for the Lucy Christopher 500 words and the top Vlog entries from the summer challenge were celebrated as well.

The Third Form was given the task from their English class over the Easter Holidays of either entering a piece of writing or learning a poem to perform without notes from the Poetry by Heart website. Heats were hotly contested in their English lessons and then the top two from each class went on to the finals. The finals included 16 pupils; all of whom put a huge effort into learning their poems and managed to get over their nerves in front of 150 of their peers. The winners of the competition judged by the Headmaster and Mrs Puranik were: First, Clara Tearle (Queen's); Second, Archie Blake (Grenville); Third, Malek Salem (Grenville) and joint Fourth, Henry Hink (Walpole) and Alexander West (Grenville).

The pupils who decided to enter the 500 words competition handed in their pieces during the first week of term, the top 18 entries were then sent to be judged by Lucy Christopher herself. Lucy Christopher is an award winning Young Adult author who has a PhD in Creative Writing and teaches at Bath Spa University. After a hard weekend reading, Lucy Christopher presented the winning entries. First was Louis Ford (Bruce), Second, Clara Tearle (Queen's), Third, Joshua Green (Chandos) and honours

to Alexander Crasneanscki (Walpole) and Constantine Chu (Temple).

Over the summer of 2017 all of the Third Form were challenged to read a book from a selected list and do a Vlog entry review to be viewed in the first week of term in their English lessons. We felt in the Library that they had put so much effort into their work, it was a shame for it not to be recognised so we judged all of them and the winning entries were; First place, Cecily Hopkins (Queen's); Second, Alexander West (Grenville); and joint Third place to Annie Saghri (Nugent) and Lucy Walduck (Queen's).

After the Poetry by Heart Competition, Lucy Christopher held a creative writing workshop for Third and Fourth Form selected pupils who had been either recommended by their English teachers or had been in the Poetry Slam. The pupils impressed Lucy Christopher very much indeed with their creativity and enthusiasm.

Richard Hopkinson-Woolley (Chandos 87) presented an engaging and insightful talk on routes into and careers in Law. The talk started with an overview of Richard's

A Levels at Stowe and how this led him to read Classics at Oxford, later completing the one year law conversion course. Richard expertly guided Stoics through his early career starting at Simmons & Simmons, which led him to return to the firm 26 years later as a partner.

Pupils were guided through a discussion around if a career in law was for them, career options from barristers and solicitors to alternative specialists in HR, tax etc. and how a city law firm differs from other legal practices. The discussion then moved to look at what it is like to work in the City of London, then progressing to recent developments in the legal sector.

Pupils then discussed the various direct and indirect routes into law and the myriad of kinds of law that are practiced. This included a detailed explanation of how a merger and acquisition works in context with the various types of lawyers that may be required to complete this type of complex transaction, especially when

dealing with multi-national corporations.

The talk concluded with a discussion around the importance of early applications for work experience, degree choice, university choice and what many law firms look for in an employee: intellect; resilience; long term commitment; motivation; commercial approach; influencing ability; and personality.

"Doing something that you are good at, and that you enjoy, is really important. In a marketplace where adaptability is everything, I am living proof that there is a place for using and developing the skills you already have, to build an enjoyable and meaningful career."

Dave discussed the value of being creative and embracing an entrepreneurial frame of mind, as is taking risks and trying new experiences. The key message from the presentation was to encourage young people to be brave and have a go, because you never know where it will lead.

It was very pleasing to see our groups demonstrate excellent navigational skills in poor visibility and sub-zero conditions on the tops. I hope that in the years to come they will remember the skills they have learnt and continue to be better equipped in the hills than others we encountered and provided assistance to on the summits!

The Bronze Practice expedition to the Cotswolds last weekend also provided the participants with the experience of spending time in the outdoors in very unseasonable temperatures. The northerly wind ensured that everybody kept wrapped up warm and, as it picked up overnight, the sound of whipping fly-sheets meant that sleep was limited for most. Fortunately however the rain, that was forecast in the run up to the expedition, stayed away and the groups were able to enjoy the beauty of the Cotswold countryside in hazy sunshine by the afternoon of the second day. Over the course of the year the Bronze participants have weekly training sessions on nutrition, navigation and camperaft and staff were certainly impressed by the skill level of many of our participants.

Congratulations to all those who successfully completed their practice expeditions in what have been very challenging conditions. Everybody is now keeping fingers crossed that the conditions improve for the Assessed Expeditions later in the term, when the Golds will be heading to the Cairngorms, the Silvers to Snowdonia (practice) and the Bronzes to the Shropshire Hills.

## Stowe PGA Golf Coaching & Development Trip — Portugal 2018

At the beginning of the Easter break, Stowe golfers set sail for the sunkissed fairways of the Algarve as we embarked upon another exciting six day PGA Golf Coaching and Development Trip to Portugal. With 19 Stoics participating, we based ourselves at the award winning Amendoeira Golf Resort, home to both the Faldo and O'Connor championship courses, along with a 9-hole Academy course and superb practice and teaching facilities. With daily expert PGA coaching provided by Andrew Hancox, Stowe's PGA Golf Professional and Head of Golf, it was no surprise to see the Stoics making significant progress with both their golf swing techniques, short games and overall on course performance. Through use of the latest V1 digital golf coaching software, Stoics were able to compare and contrast their biomechanical swing patterns during both practice sessions and on course competitions, thus developing their understanding throughout. I was impressed with the Stoics' understanding of some complex technical concepts including ball flight laws and spin regulation and control. Special mention must go to Ed Snushall (Fifth Form, Temple) who worked incredibly hard on his golf swing mechanics and reaped the rewards out on the golf course throughout the tour.

In addition to playing the O'Connor and Faldo courses at Amendoeira, we visited two of Portugal's most prestigious and iconic venues – Quinta do Lago (South Course) and Vale do Lobo (Ocean Course). Quinta has been at the forefront of international golf since its creation and today the resort boasts three outstanding golf courses all of which are among Europe's best. These exceptional golfing credentials, including being named "Europe's Best Golf Destination" at the World Golf Awards in 2015 and 2016, ensure Quinta do Lago's place among the world's golfing elite.

In a very closely fought contest, Tom Youds (Fifth Form, Chandos) was crowned winner of the inaugural Stowe Golf Portugal Classic after recording the lowest 36-hole gross score.

Max Smith (Fifth Form, Cobham) was a very close runner up and played some superb golf on the Faldo Course. In the handicap competition, Edward Wentworth-Stanley (Lower Sixth, Chatham) finished runner up to Freddie Smith (Fifth Form, Cobham), who capped off an excellent overall performance. It was also particularly pleasing to see Ed Snushall playing such good golf and clearly making excellent use of the expert PGA coaching available throughout the trip.

## Trip to Iceland


We left Stowe before sunrise on Saturday 24 March and travelled to Gatwick where we caught our flight to Keflavík Airport in Iceland. After meeting Ian, our tour guide, we got on our bus and headed to the capital of Iceland, Reykjavík. We spent the afternoon exploring and shopping in the centre of Reykjavík before heading off to Hotel Örk in Hveragerði where we would be staying. The Stoics headed straight to the outdoor heated pools!

Sunday started off with a trip to the not-so-secret Secret Lagoon, a geothermal spring which was very relaxing after a busy term. We then visited Gullfoss Waterfall and it was spectacular to see the fall from many different vantage points. We then went to Geysir, to see the Strokkur Geysir, which every 6-8 minutes erupts naturally heated water into the air. The Stoics learnt the hard way that it was not a good idea to stand in the direction of the wind while the Geysir erupted unless they were desperate for a shower!

We had lunch and then walked the circumference of Kerið Crater, the final imprint of a volcanic eruption thousands of years ago. Our final stop of the day was Thingvellir National Park and Mid-Atlantic Ridge. In the Park, you can clearly see the Mid-Atlantic ridge where the Eurasian and North American plates meet. It also featured as a location in the TV series 'Game of Thrones'. We then travelled back to the hotel for dinner and use the outdoor swimming pool to rest our weary legs.

On Monday we planned to climb an ancient volcano called Storidimon, but couldn't as it was too windy (gusting over 90mph!). Instead we travelled a bit further to see the Seljandsfoss waterfall and walked around behind it too. Just a few minutes walk from Seljandsfoss was another 'secret' waterfall which was hidden inside a cave. We had to tread carefully through a shallow stream to get into the cave but it was well worth it as the views were breathtaking. We then went to the newly built Lava centre where we learnt more about the volcanic activity and formation of volcanoes around Iceland with some very modern digital equipment. Following this we moved on to the Hekla centre - dedicated to the overdue eruption of the Hekla volcano which overshadows the area. We drove only an extra 100m above sea level to visit a pumice quarry but got blown around (some Stoics nearly taking off!) before heading back to the earthquake simulator in Hveragerði which simulates a 6.9 magnitude earthquake that hit the town in

On Tuesday we went to the south western and barren coastal area, looking at Kleifarvatn Lake, down to Reykjanesta to see more hot pools and on to the bridge between the two tectonic plates/continents before getting back to the airport for the journey home.







### Rosslyn Park Senior 7s

## Hugo Robinson passes Master Cadet Course

Having been through a rigorous national selection process, Cadet Sgt Hugo Robinson (Lower Sixth, Grenville) gave an excellent account of himself on the annual Master Cadet Course and is now one of just 9, CCF Master Cadets to be awarded the accolade this year. (To put this in context, there are around 43,000.00 Cadets in the CCF.) A fantastic achievement after an extremely tough and demanding course.

Hugo wrote: 'The Master Cadet Courses are for the best cadets from across the UK. It tests in-depth knowledge of field craft and ability to survive and remain competent and positive on a long, demanding tactical exercise. Throughout the four days we spent in the field we were assessed and minutely examined on how we worked as team players and as leaders.

This was achieved through the allocation of deliberately challenging command appointments in military based activities such as command tasks, recce-ing enemy locations and section attacks. We had to patrol tactically from location to location, given just the grid coordinates, making navigating around the training area interesting and realistic. We spent four days in the field (woods) sleeping in a harbour area, having to move quietly, without light and set sentries all hours of the day. My allocated stags were 2300, 0130 and 0500 hrs. The sleep deprivation element was probably the most challenging aspect of the course, having to keep watch at 2:00 in the morning when it is cold and raining puts a lot of strain on your moral strength but in the end I benefited enormously from proving to myself that I could do it and still operate and remain effective the next day. As a result of passing this course I feel confident in my depth of field craft knowledge and increased experience and am very proud to have proved my ability to successfully lead people under stressful conditions.'


Cecily Hopkins (Third Form, Queen's), took part in her first ever affiliated British Eventing competition in Cambridge on Sunday 22 April.

## Exciting plans from the Stowe House Preservation Trust

Over the May Half Term, The Stowe House Preservation Trust work will install replicas of the exact statues that graced the south portico up to the time of the Great Sale of 1920. Six of the eight original statues have been traced and the owners have kindly given permission for copies to be taken. The copies have been made by Cliveden Conservation and are now ready to be installed. We are immensely grateful to a number of Old Stoic donors and one anonymous benefactor for making this possible and look forward to seeing the niches on the back wall and the two side statue bases once again filled as shown in the historic images below. The rear niches will be occupied by four colossal female figures, while the side bases will house groups representing classical scenes, Hercules and Antaeus and Samson and the Philistines.

Next, attention will turn to completing North Hall, where the ceiling had been restored in 2015. At that stage, it was not possible to agree a scheme for the restoration due to the evolution of the Hall and uncertainty as to its exact appearance

at each stage. The emergence of the original of another statue, this time of the Irojan priest Laocoön and his sons being attacked by a sea serpent, enabled SHPT to fix the date of the restoration to around the time of Queen Victoria's visit in 1848, when the statue took pride of place in the North Hall. The statue is a copy of a Greek piece that is widely held to be one of the great masterpieces of antiquity and it will certainly be a talking point!

Our focus will then turn to the State Dining Room, Temple Room and small dining room. Fundraising is underway for the complete restoration of these, the last of the great state rooms. If you would like to help with a donation, please contact the Development Office.

Finally, a new book will be published in May outlining the significant and history of Stowe House, the work to restore it and the development of the site by the School since 2000. Copies will be available for sale at Speech Day.

# Sixth Form Physicists visit CERN and Geneva

The Stowe physics trip to Switzerland over Easter was a great success. Particular thanks go to Mr and Mrs Hart for taking us and to Mr Donoghue for getting up in the middle of the night to drive us to Gatwick even though he wasn't coming. Other than when one of us realised, at Swiss customs, that his passport was in the hold, travel was uneventful.

Our three days were packed full of activity and were a perfect balance of physics, culture, and window shopping (we had forgotten that Switzerland was the 'world capital of horology').

It is difficult to pick out highlights, but our visit to CERN was brilliant (even though we could not see the Large Hadron Collider as it was being used) - we saw the origin of the World Wide Web and visited the "Antimatter factory" where we were told they created 'anti-hydrogen' on a regular basis! To do this there are antiproton decelerators that slow their speed so that they can be joined with positrons. We were told that the anti-hydrogen only lasts for about 1000 seconds! Many experiments are currently being carried out on anti-hydrogen, comparing its properties with hydrogen. So far they think that all the known properties match!

The History of Science museum was also

amazing. We were taken from the beginning of documented science, through the time and brilliance of Einstein and on to current nuclear physics.

The culinary highlight of the trip was definitely a traditional cheese fondue meal, that was accompanied by a duo on accordion.
