# A Level Drama

Huge congratulations and credit must go to the thirteen members of the Lower Sixth A Level Drama group and their teaching staff, who over two nights on Wednesday 6 and Thursday 7 March, presented their devised and original exam performance pieces to an eclectic audience made up of fellow Stoics, staff, family and friends.

Taking as their inspiration the varied theatre techniques associated with the work of theatre company, Complicité, each group were not only able to engage and entertain, but also demonstrate a genuine level of sustained skill and understanding that was worthy of high praise and even higher

Ruby Redfern (Queen's), Juliana Ziemele (Queen's), Flora Walters (Nugent) and Rosie Ludlow (Lyttelton) set their 'The Stepford Wives' inspired mystery in the location of Dream Town - an idyllic 1950s suburbia, where the ever-smiling, polite and uber-friendly residents welcome a newcomer to their fold. However, everything is not as it appears and the climax of the performance saw a dark and menacing physical theatre sequence in which 'perfection pills' were forcefully administered to the newcomer, in order for her to fit in accordingly.

Sascha Clark-Jones (Bruce), Dominic Selvey (Chandos) and Maria Sharipova (Stanhope) cleverly used the backdrop of the current, British political landscape to present a funny, observant and satirical piece linked to the creation of a new party and their attempt to win a political campaign. All three group members were at ease in delivering the witty dialogue

and effortlessly switched characters with skill and aplomb. We had an array of stereotypical characters on show, from the hard-nosed political analyst to the pretentious advertising/ media consultants who were capable of just about spinning anything.

Maddie Marriott (Nugent), Izzy Hopkins (Lyttelton) and Georgie Page-Turner (Stanhope) drew their inspiration from Angela Carter's 'The Bloody Chamber' and asked their audience to think carefully about what it is to be a woman in today's fragile and fractured world. The use of music and video technology in this piece was particularly note-worthy and the dark, menacing and foreboding undercurrent left the audience with plenty of food for thought, especially after seeing the two previous light-hearted and quirky presentations.

The exploits and courage of Edith Cavell are truly inspiring and it was the remarkable legacy of this World War One British Nurse; who helped over 200 Allied soldiers escape from German-occupied Belgium that Mia Dettori (Nugent), Sonya Sander (Lyttelton) and Georgia Glenser (Lyttelton) took as their sensitive and compassionate starting point. All three performers skilfully and effectively switched seamlessly from an array of characters, in order to tell their story. The physical theatre and movement aspects were handled with real skill and the tragic ending was a sobering way to end the evening.

## Phillips Exeter Academy Choir

On Saturday 9 March, Stowe welcomed touring musicians from the Phillips Exeter Academy in the United States to perform a concert in Chapel, alongside our own choir and orchestra. The groups from Exeter had previously given concerts in Westminster and at Oxford University with Stowe being the final concert of their UK tour. The concert opened with the Exeter Choir performing four unaccompanied songs. The quality of their performance was exceptional and the sheer power of their sound completely filled the large space in chapel. The Stowe Chapel Choir followed with a tender performance of John Rutter's 'I wonder as I wander'. Next up were two collaborative items between the Exeter Chamber Orchestra and the Stowe Orchestra. The first of these was Elgar's delightful 'Chanson de matin', which was followed by Grieg's 'Holberg Suite' directed with poise and control from the violin by Stowe Head of Strings, Chris Windass. The Exeter Chamber Orchestra then performed music by Johann Christian Bach and Bela Bartok with supreme skill and musicality. The concert concluded with a moving performance of Tarik O'Regan's 'Triptych' by the Exeter Choir and Orchestra. The impressive performances given by both schools were really appreciated by the audience and we look forward to potential collaboration in the future!

On Friday 8 March, the Stowe House Preservation Trust (SHPT) completed the restoration of the North Hall. Visitors will now see the previously restored ceiling in all its glory, thanks to an improved lighting scheme. The two classical relief sculptures have also benefited from improved spot lighting that enhances the presentation of these two historic and highly significant pieces. The walls have been painted in a pale stone, matched as closely as possible to the finish that was found during research into paint schemes to have been on the walls prior to Queen Victoria's visit and deliberately toned to make the correct transition to William Kent's painted ceiling. Sixteen different paint schemes were identified, dating from 1734 to the 1960s and this was chosen as the most representative for the period to which the restoration was timed, when Carbonneaux's copy of the famous Laocöon statue stood in the hall. The Laocöon is currently being cast in a foundry in east London and will

be installed over the summer. Perhaps the most notable change has been the replacement of the modern terrazzo floor with a Purbeck Whetson, believed, again from detailed archival research, to represent the floor surface at the time selected for the restoration. Further finishing touches include authentic green colouring to the staircase balustrade with gold leaf detailing. Research continues to source a suitable copy of Giambologna's Mercury for the niche at the top of the stairs and Roman Emperors for the console bases on the upper walls.

The Stowe House Preservation Trust is a separate charity formed to fundraise for and manage the restoration of Stowe House and to present the historic house to the public when possible. SHPT's next project will be the restoration of the State Dining Room from May 2020. Fundraising continues for this work, for details please see the

## 'Do No Harm' - Henry Marsh Book Review

Last month, a Scholars' trip was organised for us to visit Blackwell's bookshop in Oxford, where we were asked to choose some books for the School Library in an area that we were interested in. As I am looking to go into medicine in the future, I found a book about a neurosurgeon named Dr Henry Marsh.

'Do No Harm' is all about his life as a neurosurgeon, his patients', their outcomes and how the British health care system would frequently get in the way. Dr Henry Marsh works in a large London Hospital and throughout the book recounts his stories of operations he has untaken - most being successful - but all too often there are those that fail. In one chapter, Marsh recounts visiting a nursing home dedicated to caring for patients with catastrophic brain damage. He writes, "The doors were all open and through the doorways I could see the motionless forms of the patients in their beds, to my dismay I recognised at least five of the names." These are patients that, in Marsh's own words, he "wrecked" in operations that went wrong.

Dr Henry Marsh's painfully honest approach to his writing, and his understanding that surgeons, like their patients, are humans that make mistakes, is what really makes this book so fascinating. However, when it comes to neurosurgery the stakes are at their highest - where any small error could lead to irreversible brain damage. The operations themselves are captivatingly described, and one could see that Marsh has a deep understanding of the brain and its complicated structure that he shares with the reader, as well as a genuine care, and compassion for his patients. There is also some dry English humour thrown in, every now and again, at the expense of the NHS and the hospital administration.

Perhaps one of the main reasons I enjoyed reading this book, was that it gave me an insight into what life is really like for a doctor. Marsh never shies away from detailed descriptions of surgery, in the fear that readers may be too squeamish, but is completely truthful in his accounts of the sometimes brutal procedures that he has to go through as a neurosurgeon. This honesty meant that, by the end of the book, I also felt I had some level of understanding of the highs and lows of neurosurgery and could really comprehend just how difficult a job surgeons have.

Overall, I felt this was a very interesting book and one that is well worth a read if you get the chance. I would definitely recommend it to anyone who has an interest in medicine or just wants to know what life is like for doctors today.

## Careers Talk: Entrepreneurship

On Friday 8 February, over eighty Stoics attended a talk in the Music Room on Entrepreneurship. Many Stoics may be already considering starting their own companies or working for entrepreneurial firms. As aspiring entrepreneurs living and studying in such a creative environment as Stowe, we provide advice on how to create a business, grow a business from concept, launch to maturity and, of course, how to secure finance for such a

To help our budding entrepreneurs understand some of the potential routes to success, we were lucky enough to secure two entrepreneurs for a careers talk. Ollie Forsyth, who is at the start of his career, and Brian Marcel who has recently published an autobiography of his career - 'Raise the Bar, Change the Game'.

Ollie guided us through his first entrepreneurial venture in which he secured enough free products from suppliers to start his own online business. With virtually zero capital, Ollie, at the age of 14, started his own firm as a sole trader. Later, after leaving school, Ollie started a subscription-Later, after leaving school, Ollie started a subscription-based entrepreneur networking company, which grew to over 30,000 members. Ollie explained that due to the pressures of managing such a venture and the changing nature of the sector, he then transformed the business into the online platform 'Makers Podcast'. "We find out how the most successful founders have created immense success, but we also want to find out how they overcame those toughest obstacles, both for the business and personally." We wish Ollie the best of success with his new venture and hope to hear from him in a couple of years to see how the business model has evolved.

Brian Marcel (Chatham '63), expertly guided a room of more than 80 Business and Economics students and one Headmaster through his career, starting when he was in sales and then moving onto how he saw the collapse of the Soviet Union as a business opportunity. His venture brought bar code technology to a part of the world that needed change, and the opportunities that accompanied the fall of the USSR, globalisation and later the enlargement of the EU. Throughout his talk, Brian explained how he adapted to the various opportunities that presented themselves. Although the talk was based around his fascinating career and how Brian has mentored a number of entrepreneurs to become millionaires, the key messages he shared was to be brave, have a go and don't make excuses for not starting your own business. Brian kindly gave a copy of his book to all Stoics in attendance at the talk and I am sure that we will refer to this in the entrepreneurship unit in their Business A Level.

Languages Society members thoroughly enjoyed a talk given by Stacey Stockwell, a well-known sign language specialist on Wednesday 6 March. The talk commenced with the current problems in society regarding disability; primarily the mistreatment of disabled people and the lack of services provided for them. Did you know that that you are three and a half times more likely to become disabled in your life than suffer any other serious illness and 83% of people are not born disabled, but become disabled later on in their lives?

It was shocking to learn about the constant derogatory actions towards disabled people in society today. Mrs Stockwell gave us the example of a call centre dedicated to helping disabled people with allegations of disrespect, receiving more than 150,000 calls per week. This is a staggeringly high number and Mrs Stockwell is endlessly trying to raise awareness of how easy it is to communicate with people with disabilities, if only you know how. We then proceeded to learn the alphabet in sign language starting with the vowels on your fingers and then learning individual letters. Shortly afterwards, we tried to complete a sentence in sign language - 'The quick brown fox jumps over the lazy dog'. A sentence using all the letters of the alphabet. After 10 minutes, everyone in the audience could use British Sign Language (BSL); however sometimes we did get a little mixed up! Furthermore, Mrs Stockwell addressed some members of the audience using sign language and she enthusiastically expressed how easy it is and why everyone in society should take 10 minutes out of their day to learn BSL, as it may come in extremely handy at some stage in your life. Overall, it was a truly fascinating talk and we are extremely grateful for Mrs Stockwell taking the time to speak to us.

#### **Badminton Championships**



#### Arek Hersh MBE

On Thursday 29 February, Third Form History and Philosophy & Religion students visited the Beth Shalom Holocaust Memorial Centre in Nottingham. The Centre provided an opportunity to learn about the gradual progression of persecution within Europe, and consider how and why such events were able to unfold. Students then heard the testimony of Arek Hersh MBE, a survivor of the Holocaust. Having grown up within Poland, Arek was separated from his family, and sent to a forced labour camp at the young age of 11. Managing to survive this experience through misleading Nazi officials about his age and work experience, he was later moved to a ghetto. With no-one to support him, he sought help from a local orphanage, who provided him with the shelter

and food he needed. However, at the age of 14, the ghetto was liquidised and Arek was sent to Auschwitz Birkenau. Despite the awful conditions, and being witness to horrific events, Arek persevered and fought for his survival every day.

The students listened to his account in awe, and being able to see his ID number tattooed on his arm made the experience much more personal. A range of questions were put forward by Stoics, considering not only the events which happened to him, but also how it has affected his faith in the long term. ## **Stowe Performance Programme**

The Stowe Performance Programme is designed to support our Sports Scholars and elite athletes through strength and conditioning, sports psychology, nutrition advice and more. The programme was redesigned and relaunched in September 2018 with a new team of coaching staff and a new look programme.

The Senior Performance Programme Team have a session every Monday afternoon and the Junior (Third Form and Fourth Form) every Wednesday. During the Michaelmas Term the PP squad covered a range of different areas including; weight-lifting with specific emphasis on technique, speed and agility, co-ordination and teamwork. The idea behind these sessions is to firstly improve the technical and physical capability of our elite performers but also educate our students so they are prepared for high level training outside of School, whether that be academy sessions during their time at Stowe or at university and professional clubs after they leave.

In November, Sports Psychologist Rich Hudson gave a lecture on 'Playing Under Pressure' and the pressure myth. He presented the idea that pressure does not exist and what we perceive as pressure is a culmination of other factors we allow to affect our mental state.

After Christmas, the PP sessions were more and in specific two week blocks. Our agility session at the track focussed on quick foot work, turning and turn of pace. Both Seniors and Juniors have taken part in three strength circuit sessions that



got the blood pumping!

The PP team were also given a leadership seminar with plenty of coach/athlete discussion about their role and what the athletes can do to get the best from those around them. Every member of the PP squad saw themselves as a leader as we discussed just how much we can impact our team mates.

Our second talk was from Dr Tony Baross on Sports Nutrition. Dr Baross discussed our dietary requirements and recommended proportions of different food types. He also spoke to us about snacks and what we could and should be eating before and during sports events.

The Performance Programme has been a huge success as we aim to reach that 'next level', whatever that next level may be for our students.




