

Headmaster's Welcome

At the start of term we welcomed more than 200 new Stoics and, with a record 785 pupils enrolled in the School, Chapel will soon reach its full capacity. We celebrated the School's highest ever GCSE results this summer with nearly 50% of grades reaching A or A* and there are still some re-marks in the pipeline (our faith in the exam system has been put to the test with evidence of erratic marking in a number of subjects). Our 2015 Leavers also acquitted themselves well with 70% A*-B at A2 and the majority of these new Old Stoics will be enjoying Freshers' Week at the more prestigious Russell Group universities.

Last year the Stoics heard a great deal about having a growth mindset and these exam results suggest that the idea is catching on. Stoics should embrace new challenges, accepting that there will be setbacks along the way as success usually comes through perseverance in the face of adversity and initial failure. The learning curve has a line which rises, then dips, then rises higher, rising and dipping continuously as a new skill is mastered. Per adua ad astra – to the stars with difficulty.

While Stoics and Staff were enjoying the summer break, the School was once again turned into a building site as we continue to improve facilities. Chatham benefited from a much needed refurbishment, the Gym and Weights Room has been transformed with an amazing array of modern equipment and the Biology Department was demolished with minimal resistance (building standards in the early 1970s were clearly not as rigorous as they are now). While our scientists are camping out in "portacabin city", the foundations of the new building have recently been laid and we can now see the footprint of the new Science Department. West has doubled in size and now has 29 pupils with Fielding Dodd's neo-Georgian buildings linked together for the first time. There is only one more piece of the West jigsaw puzzle to build before we have a fully constituted Sixth Form House for 50 pupils and over the coming months the Governors will be finalising the plans for West Phase III.

Stowe House Preservation Trust has enjoyed record numbers this summer and I do hope that Stoics and their parents take the opportunity to visit the superb Welcome and Discovery Centre. You will be astonished by the imaginative transformation of the space which had previously been the Sixth Form Cellar Bar and Temple Changing Room.

At the start of term I urged Stoics to reflect on the achievements of one of our most distinguished Old Stoics, Sir Nicholas Winton MBE, who died in July at the age of 106. "Nicky" Winton enrolled as a Stoic in Grenville House in 1923, the year that the School was founded, and he embodied many of the characteristics which the first Headmaster of Stowe, JF Roxburgh, instilled in Stoics: courage, tenacity, humility and good humour. Sir Nicholas rescued 669 Jewish children from Nazi occupied Czechoslovakia and today there are more than 6,000 descendants of these children who would not be alive without Sir Nicholas' heroic endeavour. His life and work serves as an exemplar to us all.

New Music Award Holder's Concert

On Wednesday 9 September, the first concert of the season kicked off with the new Third Form and Lower Sixth Music Scholars, who wowed the audience with their highly skilled performances. Olivia Ellott (Third Form, Stanhope) opened the concert with her soulful performance of Lay Me Down by Sam Smith. This was a confident performance that really showcased Olivia's strong vocal technique. Caspar Wallersteiner (Lower Sixth, Chatham) gave a very musical performance of the 60s number one hit House of the Rising Sun. Accompanying himself on the guitar, Caspar really put his own stamp on this song, resulting in a performance that was highly engaging and stylish. Alex Grinyer (Lower Sixth, Walpole) gave a sparkling, assured performance of Chopin's Berceuse on the Steinway Model D grand piano. The Berceuse is a beautiful lullaby with a simple repeated pattern in the left hand upon which the right hand plays variations which increase in virtuosity as the piece unfolds.

This was followed by a performance of Mozart's Horn Concerto no.3, where Alex demonstrated both technical skill and musical sensitivity.

Jeffrey Au (Third Form, Walpole) gave a highly lyrical and spacious performance of Chopin's Nocturne in B flat minor, a piece which is deceptively challenging and highly expressive. Jeffrey really engaged with the audience, producing a wide variety of colours at the piano. He also gave a secure performance of Bach's Cello suite no.1 on the viola. To conclude the concert, Theodore Hayes (Third Form, Chatham) gave contrasting and technically impressive performances of a Chopin Nocturne in G minor and Humoreske by Rachmaninov. From the pensive, broad melody in the Nocturne to the jovial and witty character of the Humoreske, Theodore demonstrated that he is an extremely capable, versatile and accomplished pianist.

One of the performances of the day came from the U16B team which recorded a 3-0 win in next to no time in a shortened game. The U15As although dominant were unable to force a victory and in the end had to settle for a 1-1 draw. The U14 A and B teams found the back of the net but were unable to impose themselves enough on their opposition and both teams fell short by two goals. Some strong defending and fluent attacking helped the newly formed U14C team to a fantastic 3-0 win.

On Wednesday 16 September the girls' 1st XI had a fantastic 5-1 win against local rivals Beaconsfield High. The team competed well on Saturday 19 September against a strong Repton side in a 3-1 loss. The U16As scored goals aplenty beating Repton's U16Bs 5-2. The U15As continued their assured start this term with a 1-0 victory. The U15B team recorded their first win of the season with a fine 4-0 win against Repton's U15C team. The latest incarnation of Stowe's 'Cantata Stoica' Hymnbook is now in Chapel, and it is already contributing to the potential for significant refreshment in both song and liturgy. Not only is the cover now a cheerful and welcoming colour, but the content of the Services (Morning/Evening Prayer and Holy Eucharist/ Communion) and the selection of Hymns, Songs and Chants have been thoroughly revised, with many new inclusions.

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The compilation continues the tradition of collating both well established and more recently established hymnody, and there are even newly published musical settings and hymn-words, courtesy of the compilers. The previous edition (1998) had run out, so the opportunity was embraced to re-work 'Cantata Stoica' with the following important considerations: the Book should have fully inclusive language, the hymns, songs and chants should be capable of being sung by a large and diverse congregation, the theology and spirituality of the words should be inspirational, accessible and welcoming and provide food for thought and action, and the very best of the older hymns should be bound together with the less familiar. The latter ones are those which have spoken throughout the Churches, but which have not found their way to Stowe until now. Gresham Books are to be commended on this fine publication.

The words of the dedication page are valuable and well-intentioned: 'Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me; bless God's holy Name (Psalm 100). To All Stoics - past, present and future.' Thanks must go to Mr Simon Dearsley, Co-Compiler and formerly Director of Music.

They gave a good account of themselves but were unable to progress against Headington School, who saw off the champions of USA and Canada, to retain their title. Annabel Simpson (Lower Sixth, Queen's) rowed in the U16 quadruple sculls in a young club crew. They enjoyed being part of a competition with the best university rowers in the world, including Oxford, Cambridge, Brown, Cornell and Stanford.

At Henley Royal Regatta, Dani rowed in the qualifying races in a club crew, which put in a competent performance and were pleased to beat The Leys School. They are a young crew, with plenty of years left to challenge at the event.

After an excellent performance at the National Schools' Championship Singles, James Simpson (Chatham 15) was determined to fulfil his ambition to row at Henley, so he teamed up with three other single scullers from Stratford-upon-Avon, Derby and Burton-on-Trent. As a composite crew they were barred from the Junior event, so raced in the competitive Senior event. Although not able to make the top 16, they rowed well and would have been the fastest junior crew in this event.

Dani raced in a girls' eight at the British Championships at Strathclyde, but despite a promising row they were squeezed out of the A Final by Henley Rowing Club and the Scotland crew for the Home International. Business Society

On Tuesday 8 September, the Business Society welcomed Graham Jones, from the University of Buckingham, author of 'Click.ology' and 'Sales Genius: 40 insights from the science of selling' who presented an engaging talk on the hypercompetitive world of e-commerce to over 60 Stoics.

There was a brief discussion of the history of the internet and how traditional bricks and mortar institutions tended to ignore e-commerce, which gave rise to entrepreneurial innovation of the likes of Facebook, Amazon and Alibaba.

Interesting facts that stood out:

- 80% of Google searches are not clicked. 30 seconds later, that same user searches again. This is an indication of how inefficient Google is, but Google is "the best of a bad bunch".
- Google was founded by two PhD students.
- ASOS' turnover is \$1bn per annum.
- Amazon's turnover is \$1bn every 3 days.
- Alibaba's turnover is \$1bn every 12 hours (most pupils had not heard of this relatively new company).

Graham discussed emerging technologies that the sector predicts will change not only our shopping practices, but also our lives. He stated that he predicts these changes will happen as quickly as in the next five to 10 years.
